Training Programme Report for IYC 2025 for the month of June, 2025

CEAS of NCRC organised Training Programme on “**Responsible Governance, Compliance and Sustainability for Cooperative Information Officers (CIOs) of Multi-State Cooperatives**” from 24 – 26 June, 2025. This programme was organized for Cooperative Information Officers of Multi State Cooperative Societies of India. The role of CIOs is pivotal in addressing members' issues, providing information, and ensuring compliance with the new regulatory framework. The Cooperative Ombudsman serves as the Appellate Authority for any decisions made by the CIOs of the Multi-State Cooperative Society. Members have the option to appeal against these decisions using Form VII as provided in the MSCS Rules 2002.

The programme was attended by 28 participants from Kerala, Gujarat, Haryana, Punjab, Uttarakhand, Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, Haryana and New Delhi. All the lectures were delivered by subject experts.

Following topics were covered during the programme:

All the participants gave their feedback and were satisfied with the topics and faculties.

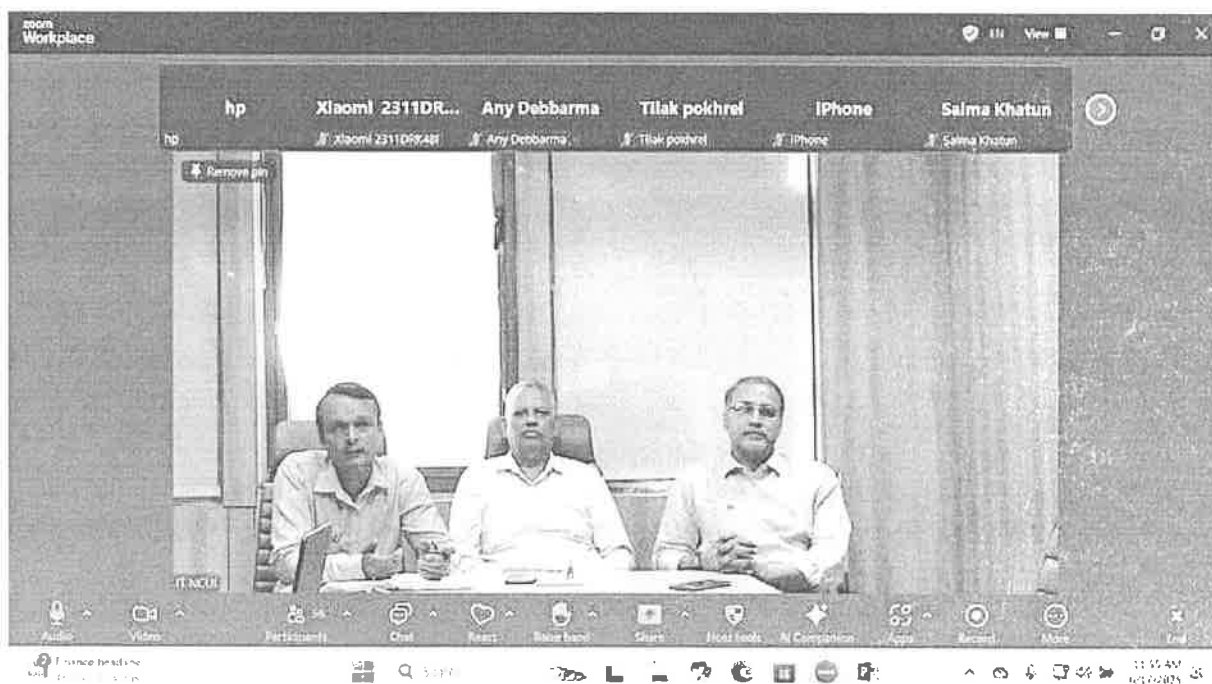


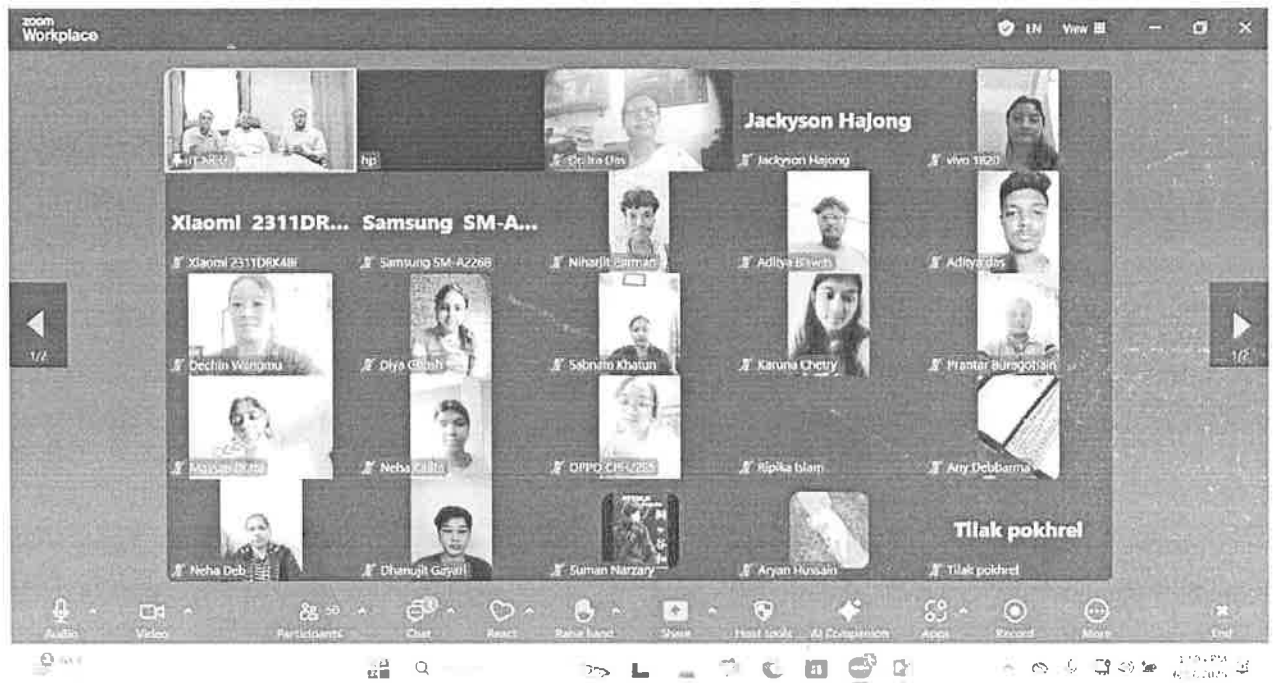

IYC Report for the month of June, 2025 of NCCE

1. Programme on 'Cooperation & Cooperative Management' for IFFCO officials of Phulpur Unit, Prayagraj, Uttar Pradesh



NCUI concluded the two days training programme on 'Cooperation & Cooperative Management' for IFFCO officials of Phulpur Unit on 06th June, 2025. This training programme was designed by the Deputy Chief Executive of NCUI Smt. Savitri Singh to provide participants with extensive knowledge of Cooperatives. Smt. Dipti Yadav, Deputy Director, NCCE, NCUI coordinated this programme to ensure timely execution of tasks related to the programme ensuring maximum participation and benefit for all.

On final day of programme, Sh. Anant Dubey, Deputy Director apprised the participants about the importance of cooperative business in fostering the overall development of cooperative movements. He highlighted the successful cooperative model of IFFCO and its pivotal role in India's agricultural sector. Additionally, Sh. S. Raghuvanshi, Assistant Director, extensively discussed the challenges faced by cooperatives, proposed remedial actions, and presented a case study on revived cooperatives, emphasizing the role of Human Resource Management, members education etc. in ensuring the effective operation of cooperatives.

Mrs. Dipti Yadav, Deputy Director and Course Coordinator, NCCE, NCUI welcomed the participants and provided an overview of the course structure.



The training program covered key aspects of cooperative governance and policies. Mr. Rajeev Sharma, Executive Director, NCUI, led the first session on Cooperative philosophy, values, and principles. While Mr. Ved Prakash Setia, Executive Director, NCUI, took an exclusive session on the Ministry of Cooperation, New Cooperative Policy, MSCS Act, and its impact on cooperatives. After the visit, the training program covered key aspects of Ministry of Cooperation, New Cooperative Policy, MSCS Act, and its impact on cooperatives, Financial Management & Accounting, special coverage on topics like GST & other taxation policies on a Housing Cooperatives

On the concluding day of LDP many relevant topics were discussed in class sessions. Shri Lalit Goyal, Regional Manager, NHB took elaborate class sessions on Role of National Housing Bank for promotion of affordable housing. While Shri Pankaj Gupta, Dy. Chief (I&D) BMTPC took another exclusive session on New Construction Technologies Promoted by BMTPC and Cost-effective building material and technology.





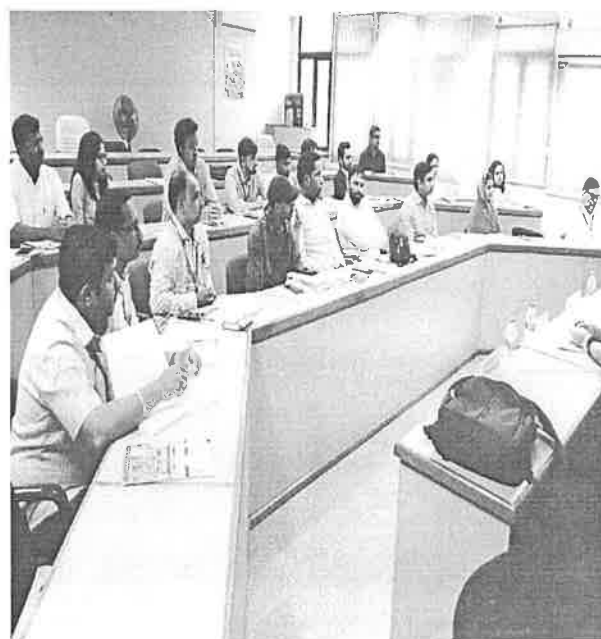

4. Certificate Course in Cooperative Law and Practices

The National Centre for Cooperative Education (NCCE), in collaboration with the University School of Law and Legal Studies, Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University (GGSIPU), has launched a two-week Certificate Course in Cooperative Law and Practices from 30th June to 11th July 2025. The course aims to build capacity and enhance legal understanding among stakeholders engaged in the cooperative sector.



The inaugural session, held on 30th June 2025, was graced by Smt. Savitri Singh, Deputy Chief Executive, NCUI, Prof. Queeny Pradhan, Dean, University School of Law and Legal Studies, GGSIPU, and Prof. (Dr.) Rakesh Kumar. Dr. Rakesh Kumar provided an overview of the course structure, methodology, and the approach to training and assessment over the two-week period. Prof. Queeny Pradhan welcomed the participants and shared the concept and relevance of the course, while Smt. Savitri Singh shared insights into the objectives and curriculum of the programme, emphasizing the role of cooperatives in inclusive development.



A total of 24 participants representing cooperative societies and federations from Maharashtra, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Delhi, and Kerala are attending the course. These participants include professionals, legal officers, and senior functionaries engaged in cooperative governance and management.

The academic sessions commenced with Prof. Queeny Pradhan delivering the first lecture on “Meaning, Purpose, Objectives and Philosophy of Cooperative Societies”. The post-lunch sessions included interactive discussions on Cooperative Governance led by Shri Anant Dubey, Deputy Director, and a detailed presentation on the Multi-State Cooperative Societies Act (Amendment) by Shri Ved Prakash Setia, Executive Director, NCU.

The programme will conclude on 11th July 2025, and is expected to equip the participants with a sound understanding of cooperative legal frameworks, compliance mechanisms, governance standards, and emerging legal challenges in the cooperative sector.

Training Session with Farmers at Mandela Khurd

An awareness event on sustainable farming was held at Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK), Delhi on 3rd June 2025. Dr. Samar Pal Singh explained two methods of paddy farming—transplanting and direct seeding (DSR). While transplanting needs more labour and water, DSR saves time but requires level land and specific seeds. He also shared how to make a natural soil mixture using cow dung, cow urine, gram flour, and soil from under a peepal tree to improve soil health. KVK will soon offer a 10-day training on natural farming. Mr. Nandan Kumar Mishra from the NCUI-GIZ Project spoke about the benefits of joining Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs), which help farmers access markets like NCUI Haat and get support for branding, packaging, and government schemes. Farmers also shared issues like high electricity bills, lack of information, and trouble in registration. The PMU team promised full support. The event also highlighted key schemes such as PM Kisan Yojana, Seed Distribution, and the Natural Farming Mission. Officials from the Delhi Agriculture Department attended and encouraged the farmers.

Training Session with Farmers, Rewla Khanpur

An training session was conducted on 4th June 2025 in Rewla Khanpur village, with the objective of promoting sustainable farming practices and advancing holistic agricultural development. The session brought together agricultural experts and local farmers to discuss key topics such as soil health, certified seed usage, organic farming, animal husbandry, and crop diversification.

In addition, the program provided practical training on branding and packaging of agricultural products, and offered guidance on how to form and operate Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs), cooperatives, and Self-Help Groups (SHGs).

The event aimed to equip farmers with both traditional knowledge and modern scientific techniques to ensure long-term sustainability, market readiness, and improved livelihoods for the farming community.

Training Session with Farmers, Hasanpur Village

A Farmers' Training Program and Social Protection Camp was organized on 4th June 2025 in Hasanpur village, Najafgarh, Delhi, to educate farmers on sustainable farming, livestock care, soil health, and government support schemes.

Agricultural experts shared practical knowledge on tackling soil salinity, using salt-tolerant crop varieties like Pusa Vijay, and improving animal health through balanced nutrition and timely vaccination. The session also highlighted the potential of barley farming, promoted agroecological practices, and encouraged farmers to reduce chemical use and adopt environment-friendly methods.

In addition, farmers were guided on branding and packaging of farm products, and the benefits of forming Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) to access better markets and government support. The program empowered farmers with valuable tools to build resilient, sustainable, and profitable livelihoods.

Training Session with Farmers, Jaunti Village

A Farmers' Training Program was held on 6th June 2025 at Government Sarvodaya Vidyalaya, Jaunti Village, Delhi, to promote sustainable agriculture and connect farmers with expert guidance and government schemes. Experts from KVK Delhi, Pusa Institute, NCUI provided training on high-yield vegetable and paddy varieties, soil health management, balanced fertilization, and livestock care. Farmers were introduced to eco-friendly pest control methods, the Meghdoot weather advisory app, and the Pusa Samachar service for expert crop guidance.

The session also emphasized the benefits of forming Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs), branding and packaging farm products, and expanding market access through NCUI Haat. Overall, the program empowered farmers with modern techniques, practical solutions, and institutional support for improved agricultural productivity and income.

Training Session with Farmers, Kharkhari Nahar

A Farmer Training Session was held on 7th June 2025 at the Kharakari Nahar Village Community Center, Delhi, focusing on sustainable and natural farming practices. Experts shared practical knowledge on livestock health, disease prevention, and udder hygiene, along with guidance on soil management, including the use of gypsum and saline-tolerant seeds. The session emphasized natural farming methods, such as composting, crop diversity, and biofertilizers, to reduce chemical dependency.

Farmers were encouraged to adopt Agroecological practices and form Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) to improve market access and collective income. They were also introduced to various government portals where they can access loans, subsidies, and schemes to support farming activities and improve their livelihoods. The session concluded with a Q&A and digital guidance tools, empowering farmers to adopt cost-effective and eco-friendly practices for long-term sustainability.

Training Session with Farmers, Malikpur Village

A Farmer Training Session was held on 7th June 2025 at the Malikpur Community Center, Delhi, to provide farmers with hands-on knowledge about natural farming, soil health, livestock care, and market access. Experts from KVK Delhi and other institutions guided farmers on suitable fertilizers, saline-resistant crops like barley, mustard cultivation, mango plantation techniques, and livestock disease prevention. The session emphasized soil testing, proper seed sourcing, and use of bio-mineral compost.

Farmers were also introduced to income-generating opportunities like mushroom farming, goat banking, and value-added products, along with the benefits of forming Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) and selling through NCUI Haat. An interactive discussion addressed real farming issues and connected farmers with ongoing support through government schemes, WhatsApp groups, and KVK channels. The session empowered participants with affordable, sustainable, and market-driven solutions for better farming and livelihoods.

Training Session with Farmers, Tatesar Village

A Farmer Training Session was organized on 9th June 2025 at MCD School, Tatesar Village, Delhi, to promote natural and sustainable farming practices. Experts guided farmers on managing saline soil and water using raised beds, salt-tolerant crops like barley and millet, and natural water treatment. Information on key government schemes such as PM-KISAN, Maandhan Yojana, Fasal Bima, and Natural Farming was shared.

Sessions also covered livestock care, seed conservation, and the use of Soil Health Cards. Farmers were encouraged to form FPOs for better market access and income growth. Practical crop advice, such as using boron for chili flower drop and adopting mixed cropping, was provided during the Q&A. The session empowered farmers with field-ready solutions, expert support, and access to government-backed opportunities for long-term resilience.

Training Session with Farmers, Tigipur Village

As part of the International Year of Cooperatives (IYC) initiative, a farmer training session was held on June 11, 2025, at Tigipur Village, Delhi, focusing on sustainable agriculture, natural farming, and enterprise development. Farmers received guidance on direct seeding of paddy, including seed treatment, weed control, and water-efficient practices. Trainings also covered preparation of organic inputs like Beejamrit, based on natural farming principles.

The importance of soil testing and proper sampling techniques was discussed to improve crop productivity. Participants were informed about key government schemes like PM-KISAN, crop insurance, Soil Health Cards, and the Agriculture Infrastructure Fund. The session emphasized value addition, use of FSSAI and MSME registrations, and leveraging digital platforms such as ONDC and NCUI Haat for market access. Farmers were encouraged to form SHGs, cooperatives, and FPOs to strengthen collective bargaining, income security, and sustainable livelihoods.

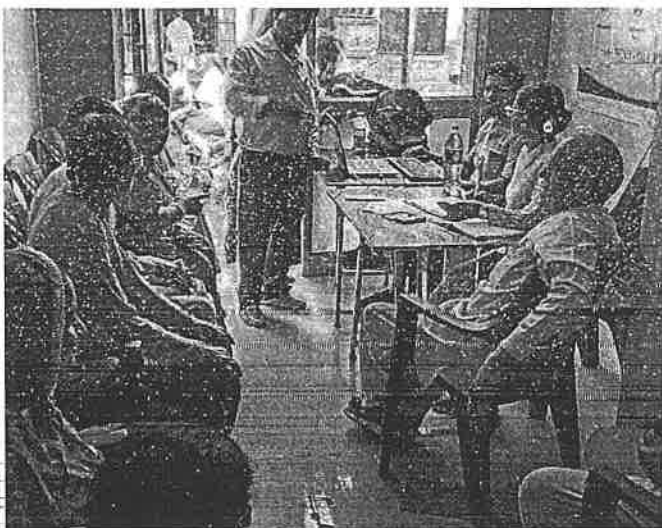


Social Protection Camp, Bakkarwala

A total of 65 beneficiaries received support, including ABHA card registration, Ayushman Bharat assistance, Aadhaar appointment booking, E-PAN creation, PVC PAN ordering, and Voter ID applications/corrections. The strong turnout underscored the ongoing need for social protection outreach and digital access facilitation within underserved communities.

Social Protection Camp, Sohna

A total of 8 individuals were supported for Ayushman Bharat (PM-JAY) enrollment, 11 beneficiaries created their ABHA health accounts, and 2 individuals received assistance with E-PAN card registration. The initiative helped bridge service delivery gaps in semi-urban areas and reinforced the importance of cooperative efforts for inclusive development.
